Breaking News – SPEED LIMIT TO BE LOWERED TO 60KMs

After a solid year of regular lobbying, close monitoring and continually following up with Council and VicRoads workers, the Harcourt Progress Association is very pleased to report we have been successful in securing a lowering of the speed limit for Harmony Way, downtown Harcourt.

This issue has been pressing for the Harcourt community since the Calder Freeway was relocated. The matter came to a head several years ago when a newly installed pedestrian crossing had to be removed because the traffic speed was incompatible with the crossing installed. The HPA took on the issue in September 2014 and have been advocating

for the lowering of the speed ever since.

Council have now advised that the road speed limit will be lowered from 70 kms to 60 kms. A push to further lower the speed to 50kms was not successful due to the low number of residents and businesses currently adjoining the main road. This may change in the future and Council will revisit the speed limit should the population in the centre of town increase.

The next item of our focus will be the re-installation of a pedestrian crossing outside the general store.

Harcourt Swimming Pool Opens

The Harcourt Pool opens on Saturday 5 December, just in time for the first heatwave of the summer!

It's going to be a great year at the pool with the Harcourt Progress Association advocating for increased community activities and events to take place throughout the season. Pool operators, the Bendigo Regional YMCA, have so far been slow to respond to proposals put before them but have confirmed that a pool party is scheduled for Saturday, 23rd January, 2016.

Council have also confirmed that they will conduct monthly "listening posts" to provide pool users an opportunity to speak directly to Council staff about the pool and its facilities. Council will hold three listening posts at Harcourt Swimming Pool during the pool season on the following times:

- Thursday 17 December 2015 5.00 pm 6.00 pm
- Tuesday 12 January 2016 2.00 pm 3.00 pm
- Wednesday 24 February 2016 5.30 pm 6.30 pm

Council has been very proactive in their support for the Harcourt Pool and has invested \$44,000 in improvements including a new shade sail, barbecue hotplate and saline water purification system. Entry prices have been capped at last season's rates and season pass holders gain entry into all Council-owned pools at Castlemaine, Maldon and Newstead. To purchase a season ticket or to make a group booking, you can call the YMCA direct on 5444 3360.

Silver Theme for Applefest 2016

In March 2016 we will be celebrating the 25th annual Applefest, our Silver Anniversary.

The committee has resolved to adopt a 'silver' theme, to be used in the displays, costumes, parade floats and advertising. For example;-

Applefest royalty will have silver sequinned material for their capes.

Ladies might wear silver 'bling.'

Harcourt's footballers to parade with their trophies (their 'silverware').

Harcourt Landcare display will feature the endangered Silver Banksia,

Costumes, floats and colour schemes could generally make use of silver alongside pink or other bright tones.

It is important that each year's Applefest be bright and fresh! The committee hopes to tap into the creativity of the community by giving early advice of the theme. Please put some thought into this and see what a bright face our community can present to the patrons of the 2016 Harcourt Applefest.

The growth of the event

The relocation of the market in 2014 and the development of a more focused layout in 2015 are two initiatives that have been enthusiastically embraced.

However the new site has also presented problems associated with dust, uneven ground and the proximity of food preparation occurring near retail stalls. The Applefest Committee received a number of complaints about these issues and has been working behind the scenes to lobby Council and other stakeholders to address and remedy these problems. The



open drain that created difficulties in March 2015 has now been piped by Shire council staff so that there will be an increase in usable area.

Plans for 2016

A key recommendation for the 2016 Applefest is to separate the food and beverage vendors from the retail stalls. It is proposed that we relocate

the Market stalls to the area of flat even ground running parallel to High Street opposite the CFA. The Festival Market will be enhanced with landscaping and a good structured layout. It is anticipated that the new Market precinct will be an attractive site and will generate interest from a wider range of stall holders. A lot of stall-holders have already booked their sites. Last year's new addition, the Kids Karnival, will be relocated a little further northwards, nearer to the swimming pool. These are encouraging signs of growth in Harcourt's big annual event.

Food, cider and wine vendors will remain in Stanley Park North, creating an entertainment precinct around the stage with plenty of seating and family-friendly entertainment. This is aligned with the trend at other regional festivals. Focusing the festival into three distinct, but neighbouring, sites of the Applefest will avoid issues associated with access and overcrowding. It also makes the event more attractive to potential market participants and to the general public.

The detailed program is now being compiled, with popular musical acts to be booked, stall sites to be reserved and parade entries being devised. The ferret races are to make a welcome return to the program. We have much to look forward to! Please be sure to mark the date on your calendar.

The Certified Organic farm won the Shire's Sustainability and Environment Award this year. Katie and Hugh decided to continue the sustainability theme by re-purposing many old bits of farm equipment for the shop and surrounds. Lucy Nairn, Landscape Designer took up the challenge and sourced bins, pallets, tyres, old scales, water tanks, wheel barrows and tubs from around the farm. The result is a charming and welcoming shop with nostalgic touches.

Special guests at the opening were the Mayor, Christine Henderson, and representatives from the Bendigo Community District Bank at Maldon including the Manager, Steve Streeter, and the Chair of the Bank, Gen Barlow. The bank sponsored the prize of \$2,000 for Business of the Year, which Hugh and Katie also won, at the Mount Alexander Business

Awards, which they put towards establishing the shop. Also present from the Shire were Claire Baker, Tourism, Marketing and Events and Vicky Mason, Director Sustainable Communities.

Katie said, "Getting the shop open was a challenge and we thank the many volunteers who assisted with the construction, layout and planting at the two working bees we had. We will be open every Friday and Sunday from 10am to 4pm and people can pick their own fruit, when the fruit is in season."

Products available at the shop are fruits in season (this week: apricots, peaches and lemons), jams made by Katie from fruit on the farm, biodynamic vegetables grown on site by Gung Hoe, Granite Springs Olive Oil, Harcourt Honey, Duck Eggs from Hillside Acres Harcourt, and a range of plant based beauty products made by Stephania Netcu of Elphinstone.





Invitation - Free Fire Ready Public Safety Information Session



A free fire ready safety information session has been scheduled for Tuesday 8th December at the Harcourt Fire Station from 7.00pm to 8.00pm. We are fortunate to be allocated these meet-

ings each year and they are the perfect opportunity for your questions to be answered as well as being able to hear valuable information to assist in preparing and planning for the fire season which this year has started earlier than normal.

If you have never attended one of these sessions before or it has been a few years since attending, then I encourage you to make a special effort this year. We look forward to seeing you. Recent attendees are also most welcome as there is always something new to learn or to just refresh what you know. Please note that CFA postpones all community meetings when the Fire Danger Rating is Code Red, Extreme or Severe.

The CFA along with Victoria Police are currently promoting the HELP CATCH BUSHFIRE ARSON-ISTS BEFORE THEY STRIKE campaign. Each year there are numerous fires that are deliberately lit or are suspicious in nature and it has been calculated that about 50% of all bushfires are believed to be deliberately or recklessly lit. Quite often it is simple observations by the public that help join the dots together in solving the cause and or person responsible. So what can you do to assist? Firstly, if you observe any suspicious behaviour call **Triple (000)** immediately. If you suspect someone of bushfire arson, call Crime Stoppers confidentially on 1800 333 000. If you are suspicious of a person or a vehicle, write down the following details: For vehicles: registration, make, model, colour and any damage to the vehicle or distinguishing features eg bullbar, mag wheels, pack rack. For individuals: age, height, hair colour, build, facial hair, clothing, ethnic appearance.

Even though December is the first month of summer, it seems like October and November forgot that they are supposed to be part of spring. This has highlighted the prediction of a long and potentially serious fire season. Recent events in South Australia and Western Australia have endorsed these predictions and reiterate the importance of preparation and to have a fire plan for you and your family. I encourage you to continue with any actions that can reduce

the threat of fire or reduces the intensity around your house and property. Be careful when carrying out any mowing and slashing especially in any new areas that may have rocks or even wire. The brigade attended a grass fire in November that was started when a piece of wire became entangled around the blade plate on a ride-on mower which shows how easily a fire can be accidently started.

And lastly as you prepare for Christmas, take special care with your electrical decorations. Christmas tree lights and overloaded power points are two common causes of house fires in the month of December.

On behalf of the Officers and Members of the Harcourt Fire Brigade, we like to wish you a happy, safe and fire free Christmas and New Year.

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No. 4: Katherine Seppings

We know Harcourt is a place with hidden treasures, but perhaps not many of its residents would necessarily name the arts among them. Yet we have among us a significant – and increasing – number of talented, often successful, occasionally illustrious, practitioners from across the spectrum of the art world.

It's difficult to know where to start with an artist like Katherine Seppings; it may be easier to list the things she hasn't done. Already an accomplished artist, photographer and writer, the recent launch of her first poetry collection, *When Embers Dance*, confirmed her as an outstanding poet, but it is merely the latest evidence of a life of creativity and enquiry.

Born and raised in Melbourne, Katherine moved to central Victoria in 1983, after the Ash Wednesday fires had laid waste large areas of the State and killed dozens of people. Incredibly, on the day of the fires she was visiting her mother, Joan Webster, discussing the need for a manual of bushfire preparation and survival. The result of those discussions was *The Complete Australian Bushfire Book*, later renamed *The Complete Bushfire Safety Book*, now an invaluable resource for anyone living in fire-prone areas.

Katherine was one of the first on the scene of those fires, documenting the devastation and recording the things she witnessed as people returned to their homes. She remembers being bombarded with strange sensations – the acrid stench of ash, her shoes melting from the heat in the ground, residents finding small items undamaged in the rubble. She had a similar experience after the fires in 2009 and fire remains a source of inspiration for all her work.

It seems she was destined to be an artist from a very early age. She remembers crying as her family drove into Melbourne from the suburbs, having witnessed the destruction of beautiful and enchanting terrace houses and workers' cottages to make way for ugly housing commission flats. That appreciation of built form continued into her art in later school years; and into her early working life.

Her paintings of old buildings in city and country settings were widely exhibited – in fact they appeared in more than 50 exhibitions before Katherine turned 21. Her photographic work gained prominence too, resulting in an appointment to the National Trust Photographic Committee at a young age.

In central Victoria, it dawned on Katherine that her skill set could be put to good use. She quickly became a "one woman band", writing stories and taking photos for local press, business and government publications. Not long after coming to the area, however, Katherine felt the urge to make the (in those days) almost mandatory journey to the UK, and found work in the commercial art and publishing field. She also worked in the relatively new field of



music video, even making the blancmange that starred in the video for the No. 1 hit *Song for Whoever*, by the band Beautiful South.

After two years or so in London, she returned to Chewton but found it very small and didn't last long before heading in the opposite direction, travelling through Canada, Mexico and New Orleans before landing in New York City and falling under its spell. She experienced the "microcosm of the world", living in Chinatown among non-English speakers, but loving the emerging hip hop music scene, as well as dance and poetry. Having lost her camera in an assault in Mexico, she began writing more frequently—including poetry for the first time.

Even New York couldn't hold her forever, so she returned home looking for family and a garden, achieving both rather more quickly than she planned. Her beautiful daughter, Maya, became her new full time occupation.

Motherhood did not stop her from taking photos, though, and Katherine realised there was an opportunity to produce high-quality tourism cards featuring Castlemaine and surrounds. Many of these images have become iconic and are still seen in shops and tourist facilities around the area.

In between poetry book launches, Katherine is working on a memoir of her time in New York, based on the journals she kept there, and a much anticipated history of the Castlemaine Artists Inc. group of unique characters from the 70s and 80s. She will also promote *When Embers Dance* at various poetry events and festivals.

Councillor Update

Hi all,

It has been a busy time on Council. There is always a range of issues and the Councillors work very hard to achieve the best results for the community.



The Council has determined that Castlemaine

will have a new indoor aquatic centre based at the existing Castlemaine pool site. As you will know this has been a drawn out decision but now we have a clear direction it will be good to see that project move into the planning phase. This project will depend on grant funding. If the funding does not eventuate in a three year period Council will review its decision.

Another task Council has been working on is a Rate Review. Our surrounding shires offer differential rates for the farm sector and I am keen to see a fair go for our farmers. One farmer told me it costs twice as much to run a sheep in our shire compared to another!! There has been discussion about other aspects of the rating including the municipal charge and waste charges. We have had advice from a consultant on rating. His tack seemed to be how we could raise more revenue. That is not the path I advocate. I want to see better value for money with how the rates are spent and for Council to live within its means. I support rate capping, however, I am disappointed it is taking so long to implement. It should be noted that the Municipal Association seems to be strongly opposed to rate capping. Our rates in Mt Alexander shire have doubled in real terms over the past ten years and I do not support that. On a positive note our shire is in good financial shape. The problem is many of our rate payers are under financial stress.

I was sorry to hear of the death of local identity Ron Rice. Ron was an outstanding member of our community and our thoughts are with his wife Wendy and family. We are very fortunate in our community to have people like Ron. He was a tireless worker; created a lot of opportunities for others in the community and if there was something that needed doing, you could rely on him.

Fire season is with us again so I do encourage people to have a good clean up around the yard if they have not done it yet. The fires in WA and SA have demonstrated the devastation that can result from bushfires.

I wish everyone a safe and happy Christmas. Remember to get the car checked out well before you plan to travel. Best regards to all,

Waste Management in the Shire

I have just completed the Shire waste management survey and found it a frustrating waste of my time and a lost opportunity. There are many good and simple solutions to Council's current management strategies in regard to waste and environment. It's important to remind ourselves also that when rate revenue is low (as it is in this Shire), every cent needs to be used carefully. There are so many good ideas in regard to waste management in the context of environment.

Management of the great swathes of weeds, grassland and trees alongside all of the shire roads should be the responsibility of the landowner adjoining the road verge. We should relocate and rebuild the fencing abutting privately-owned land (the land that is next to roads, streets and freeways) and vest the management of it with the adjoining land-owners. Currently most of the Shire's roads receive token care from Shire workers. Poisoning great swathes of perfectly good grass, which in turn results in road-side erosion, using machines that carry weed-seeds everywhere else in the Shire is not good roadside management. This land could also be grazed by farming animals or mowed at least six-monthly by land-holders.

The municipal tip should become a huge recycling venture and should be used to produce energy. This is a massive undertaking; one that requires time, energy and a will to implement. There are amazing working case studies throughout the world. The initial cost to set-up would be more than compensated over time, as energy is produced and waste in minimised.

Private ratepayers could easily bring their kerb-side rubbish and recycling to centrally located large community rubbish bins. Such bins are used extensively in Europe and are placed at strategic rural locations and in residential streets and shopping areas. These large bins would be emptied regularly; weekly, as they are now, using a much smaller fleet of vehicles.

There is so much that can be done better in terms of waste and environment. The most important thing the Shire can do is to ensure the community is involved in a real way through intelligent research questions and through a newly formed community committee focused on best outcomes for the community, environment and waste management. A good start would be the Shire itself not wasting the community's time (or the community's money) in surveys that are not worth the paper (or the computer) they're written on.

Harcourtian - Craig Carter

Most of us, when watching a film or TV series, take for granted the mix of sounds accompanying the images on the screen. Yet these sounds are pivotal to the viewing experience, adding dimension and context to what we see. The sounds of the forests, busy streets, cafes, lashing storms, demonstrations, animals, or of eeriness itself, are the craft of Sound Designers. The greater the skills of the Sound Designer and the talent with which he or she can blend the audio with the visual the better we are transported into the environment we are watching.

One of Australia's most accomplished freelance Sound Designers, Craig Carter, now lives in Harcourt North. He has received awards and nominations for his work in Australia and overseas and a lot of us, without being aware, have heard his work in The Glitch, The Slap, Oddball, Matching Jack, Babe- Pig in the City, Romeo and Juliet, Mad Max-Beyond Thunderdome and Rabbit Proof Fence.

'I have been in this business for nearly 35 years now and have sound designed some 83 feature films, 37 television series and 17 short films. Some films you remember more than others. *Malcolm* was a lot of fun, *Kenny* enjoyable, *Rabbit Proof Fence* challenging *and The Last of the Apes*, still to be released and filmed in the Congo, Borneo and Indonesia, really emotional to do. *The Last of the Apes* shows, with the encroachment of humans into their habitat, how precarious the survival of these beautiful creatures has become.



'I didn't set out to be a Sound Designer. In fact I never went to Film School. I was studying at University and enjoying listening to and playing music. An



opportunity to do some musical arrangement came up at the ABC and I left my studies to go there. My first job was working on a series on Macquarie Island which was narrated by Edmond Hillary and featured a now Central Victorian singer, Danny Spooner. I stayed on at the ABC and worked as an editor on This Day Tonight. When budget cuts hit the broadcaster in the early 80s I decided to put the skills I had acquired in film and sound editing to use as a free-lancer.

'Michael Pattinson hired me as an assistant film editor on *Moving Out*. This was in the days when you actually cut a film. Once you made a decision and cut that was it. These days with digital recordings you can change your mind and revisit your cuts. As a consequence some films, time permitting, can be cut and recut a number of times.

'I stayed on with Michael and did the sound work on his next film *Street Hero* in 1983. It opened the door for me as a Sound Designer. I have worked with some wonderful and truly gifted people and had the opportunity to work in a number of countries.

'Sound design can be slow and intensive. If I am sound designing a storm scene with dialogue where machines have been used to create the storm on set, I have to strip out the sound of the machines put in genuine storm sounds and edit in the dialogue, sometimes syllable by syllable. Very often the entire dialogue needs to be re-recorded in studio conditions and blended with the mix of sounds.

'I am currently doing the sound design on an Italian film shot in the north east of Italy. I travelled there to record atmosphere sounds - street noises, cafes, bells,



background conversations, etc. but now that the film is finished I am doing the sound design from my home. My home-based work is made possible by the NBN. Without it I'd spend more days than I do now in Melbourne and the lifestyle my wife, Fiona, and I enjoy would not be possible.

'Fiona and I are both city people. Fiona, a trained pharmacist who now works on contract to Bendigo Health, was originally from Blackburn and I grew up around Carrum on the Mornington Peninsula. We had a federation home in Brighton for 22 years. We wanted to try country living rather than die wondering if it was a lifestyle we would enjoy. We had been looking for years but really no further than Woodend. We saw a house was for sale in Harcourt North and decided to check it out. Once we saw the view and the garden we decided it was our type of place. 'We have gone from a garden you could look after

in an afternoon to one that is a bit like painting the Harbour Bridge. There are also things about country living that we had not thought about or had to confront before – fire plans, managing our water, sharing our environment with wildlife and shopping differently for supplies.'

'I don't see this as a place to retire. I see it as a pleasant place to continue doing some of the work I do now, but less of it, a place to get back to my music and also try my hand at writing.'

Keep an eye out for Craig and his high quality sound equipment. He has been known to walk around the neighbourhood recording chooks, dogs and farm noises for his sound library. I am reliably informed that a local dog provided the voice of the Maremma sheepdog in the film Oddball.

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Pips 'n' all

Hello Garden lovers.

We are well into a hot, dry summer and our garden is suffering from hot winds and lack of rain. Our highest priority is water! We are concentrating on watering new plants as their small root systems have not developed sufficiently enough to support them. We have planted Pistachios along our driveway. They are establishing nicely but their root systems will only just be emerging from the potting mix and into the surrounding soil. Watering plants through their first summer will greatly improve their success. This is true for natives as well as exotic plants.

The water level in our dam is quite low after the dry spring. I am sure many others are in the same situation. This means that effective watering is even more important than usual. We have extended our drip irrigation into a few more garden beds. Drip irrigation is very effective because it delivers water directly to the plant roots and looses little water to evaporation because the lines lie under the mulch. Having the lines on a timer is also helpful so that we don't forget about them and leave them running.

Our roses don't mind the hot weather at all and are flowering nicely. Removing dead flowers promotes flowering and keeps the bushes looking good.

This month we are:

- Watering new plants;
- Staking & feeding the tomatoes;
- Deadheading the roses;
- Tying down soft new branches of espalier fruit trees:
- Harvesting cherries; and
- Watering peaches and apricots.

This month in the woodland:

- Common Everlastings (Chrysocephalum apiculatum) are flowering; and
- Kangaroo Grass (Themeda triandra) is flowering.

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Fire Resistant Gardens


Is there such a thing as a fire resistant garden? During fire season the major menace is always wind. In my view, the best resisters are thick, fairly high close foliaged evergreens. In the 1919 period it was the fiery end of several years of bushfires, which were rarely attended by fire brigades and which were fought with wet wheat bags and homes owners' fire pumps. It was after this that some planted firebreak plants, and some of these are still around, although many are now deemed environmental weeds. These plants include Privet, Hawthorn, Italian Buckthorns and Cape Ivy.

So what should be planted to assist in the protection of your home? The most flammable trees are Cyprus, pines, eucalypts, and some other natives, so do not plant these near your house. All plants will burn in a severe fire situation, but non indigenous plants which are deciduous and densely leafy in summer are the best protection, they slow the wind and are better at not igniting under ember attack. Cleared grass areas around a house keep the house cool and make a good firebreak for a running ground fire. 


