Applefest Art Show

The artists are putting the finishing touches to their art work, the framers are flat out, and planning for the launch of the Art Show is well advanced. The Art Show has attracted many noted and skilful artists from Bendigo right down to Woodend. The format is challenging – art works must be no larger than 40cm x 40cm. This produces high quality, wonderfully detailed, moderately-priced pieces.

The Harcourt Applefest Art Show serves a really useful purpose for local artists. Noted artist, the late Margaret Olley, wrote "*The artist never really sees his or her painting until it is taken out of the studio and put on someone else's walls. Whether the works sell or not is secondary, it just allows the artist to see their own work. Also artists mostly work in isolation, and yet paintings are meant to be seen in the way that books are meant to be read. So exhibiting is part of the process of being a painter.*"

This year's show will feature some beautiful work made by students of Harcourt Valley Primary School. We are looking forward to seeing their work on display. In addition, we are planning to exhibit a near-record number of student art pieces from young people from around the district.

The Applefest Art Show will be opened on Thursday 8th March at 7.30 pm. Guest openers are Jo Porter & Elizabeth Walsh of the Regional Centre for Culture. Award-winning artist Ben Winspear will judge the art works. In addition to being named as Victorian Artist's Society Artist of the Year 2016 Ben was awarded the A.M.E. Bale travelling scholarship and had to leave Harcourt immediately after judging last year's show in order to fly to Florence to commence his studies under the Bale Scholarship. This year Ben will not have the same time pressure and will be attending the opening to announce the winners.

The Art Show will be open to the public each day, Friday to Monday, 9th to 12th March. So, even if you are frantically busy on Applefest Saturday, and cannot get around all of the Festival attractions (and there will be a lot happening) you may still have the opportunity to see (and buy)the works.

The Victorian Government has built a world class mountain bike park at Harcourt, which will be open to riders from 12 noon on Friday 9 March 2018. The Park is named La Larr Ba Gauwa, which means "stones and mountain" in Dja Dja Wurrung language. La Larr Ba Gauwa is located on a former pine plantation, two kilometres east of Harcourt township and adjacent to the Mount Alexander Regional Park. The Park is expected to have a significant impact on regional tourism, while promoting the health and wellbeing of locals and visitors.

Community Reference Group

The development of La Larr Ba Gauwa Park has been overseen by the Project Control Group, which was advised by the Community Reference Group (CRG). Chaired by Peter Skilbeck from Goldfields Track Inc, the CRG has played a vital road in ensuring the Park meets the needs of riders and the local community. With the Park due to open on Friday 9 March 2018, the CRG has completed its task and handed over to the newly formed Committee of Management, who will operate the Park in the future. We are indebted to the members of the CRG and thank them for their contribution. What's Happening?

Over the last month work has been focused on putting the final touches on the Park including:

- The off-road path connecting Harcourt township to the Park is now complete and the section closest to town is already getting plenty of use.
- Djandak has completed construction of the meeting shelter at the Park's Trailhead. This shelter was specifically designed for La Larr Ba Gauwa Park and looks terrific. Djandak has also undertaken landscaping at the Trailhead, making good use of the naturally occurring granite. Bike racks are being installed at the Trailhead.
- Promotional and directional signage is being installed at the Park, in town and along Picnic Gully Road and Market Street.
- Contractors Dirt Art are undertaking a final groom of the trails including removing branches and other debris that were blown down in recent storms.
- The new Committee of Management has met twice to prepare for taking over the management of the Park once it has opened.
- Gates have been installed across the emergency access tracks within the Park to protect the safety of bike riders, walkers and horse riders.

Park Your Car in Town and Ride to La Larr Ba Gauwa

Car parking for cyclists is in Harcourt township, opposite the CFA shed. Cycle to the Park via the 2km off-road path that runs alongside Market Street and Picnic Gully Road. There is no car parking for bike riders at La Larr Ba Gauwa Park. Riders should also note that there is no potable water at La Larr Ba Gauwa so make sure you have sufficient drinking water with you before heading off on your ride. With AppleFest taking place on Saturday 10 March, Harcourt township will be buzzing! Look out for our stall the the Applefest

Open for Applefest

The brigade will be open for public consultation on Saturday March 10th as part of Applefest. We will be supported once again by the CFA District 2 Community Education group. They will be bringing along the Little Red Fire Truck which is always a hit with the kids. The real tankers will also be on display. This is the perfect opportunity to ask any fire related questions you may have. We will also be conducting a wood raffle on the day. Make sure to take advantage of this opportunity, even if it is just to call in and say hello.

Harcourt to host District 2 Rural Fire Brigade Competitions

This year on Sunday March 25th, the Harcourt Fire Brigade will be hosting the District 2 Rural Fire Brigade Competition. The day kicks off at 9.00am at the Harcourt Recreation Reserve and will run throughout the day with a variety of events which draws on the various skills required on the fire ground. The public is most welcome, so if you are looking for something different to do on that day, come and check it out.

Fire restrictions are still in force

The end of summer has no relationship with the end of the Fire Danger Period and fire restrictions are still in force within the shires of Mount Alexander and Greater Bendigo along with many other shires. Therefore no burning off is allowed unless you obtain a permit. There is no date set yet for when fire restrictions will end, but while there is no significant rain and a change in the weather patterns, the status quo will continue. The need to continue to use extreme caution when carrying out any high risk activity that may cause a fire cannot be over emphasised. It is generally the time when people get caught out so ensure you take all precaution and prevention measures possible and don't let your guard down.

Days with strong wind are continuing which is doing further damage to trees and branches. It is important to monitor trees around your property for stress and damage and ensure vehicles and equipment are not left under trees where damage will occur if trees fall over or drop branches.

Data looked at for the Summer period by CFA for Central Victoria shows that while it was predicted that it had the potential to be a bad fire season, the combination of very hot days with strong winds and low humidity did not eventuate often. This reduced the amount and frequency of fire activity experienced. The weather pattern for March is predicted to continue to be dry so areas with fuel will continue to burn.

"Doing it right"

While the renovated Harcourt General Store on Harmony Way may open a little later than originally planned, owner Annette Rae is determined that the update will be done properly.

Annette said, "Changes are being made to the inside of the building to make it totally sound and functional. The building is again being divided into three. The layout of the residence has been changed to open it up and let in more light, room layout has been enhanced and the two en-suites are being totally renovated. The residence has been isolated from the shop to ensure privacy and it will have its own drive way and garden. Where there are wooden floors, re-stumping has been done and the electricity has been completely re-worked for safety and convenience. The other sections of the Store are the kitchen and the main areas for produce display and dining. The third section of the building is being renovated as a separate retail outlet. We are excited to be able to offer this space for another business in Harcourt."

Annette also plans the addition of a verandah across the entire front of the building. "We think the verandah will give a whole new impression of the building; people should find it more welcoming from the moment they see the exterior. And we really appreciate the support we have been getting from Harcourt residents both in person and by email. We are in the planning stages with our logo and website and will be launching that in the near future as well," Annette said.

Harcourt Heritage Centre

Ebenezer Eagle A prominent figure in Harcourt public life.

Ebenezer (Eb) Eagle was born at South Morang in 1871, the son of Joseph Eagle and his wife Ruth (nee Jolley). Ruth and Joseph had been married in the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Preston in 1864 and thus chose to give their eldest son his biblical name. Eb Eagle's uncle, William Eagle was a pioneering orchardist of Harcourt. Eb Eagle grew up at Greensborough and came to Harcourt as a young man, with his three brothers, Reuben, Harry and Ben. The brothers worked for Dr Seelenmeyer to clear most of the land along the south side of McIvor Road, North Harcourt. When the land was to be sold by Dr Seelenmeyer, Eb Eagle, at the urging of James Lang, bought 90 acres and his brother Reuben did likewise, owning the adjoining block. Both blocks were then planted with fruit trees. Eb Eagle married Bertha Gaasch. His brother Reuben married Amelia Gaasch, Bertha's sister.

Eb Eagle became a very prominent figure in Harcourt public life, being a Director of the Harcourt Cooperative Coolstores from the outset, and a founder and office-bearer of the Harcourt Fruit Growers Association when that organization was effectively Harcourt's Progress Association. He was always willing to help the underdog, particularly the new beginner in the fruit game. He was one of the advocates for the extension of the Coliban Channel system into the Porcupine area.

During the Great War Eb Eagle organized teams of orchardists to maintain the many acres of fruit trees of the young men who had gone to serve in Europe. This selfless work was carried on for over four years. Eb Eagle was a playing member of the Brooks Cricket Club and the Brooks Tennis Club. In fact he donated the land on which the Brooks Tennis Club played. He was one of the first men to own a motor car in Harcourt – a Buick.

Newspaper accounts of the many "Welcome Home" evenings for Harcourt's young men returning from service in the Great War generally state that Mr. Eb. Eagle drove the young man's family to the station to meet the returning soldier, drove them to the ANA Hall and then, after a great celebration, the young man and his parents were motored home in Mr. Eagle's car.



The orchards of Eb and Reuben Eagle were said to be among the best organized and most successful in the district. Eb and Bertha Eagle had three children, Adolphus, Kenneth and Florence. Second son Ken Eagle became prominent in Harcourt during the Second World War as the administrator of the government's Apple & Pear Marketing Authority, which had been set up to ease the plight of the growers who could not export their crops.

After retiring from fruit-growing Eb and Bertha went to Bendigo to live. Eb Eagle died 12th July 1951 aged 81 years. Bertha died 29th October 1958 also aged 81 years. Both are buried at Harcourt.

Eb Eagle has an assured place in Harcourt history as a community leader in fruit-growing and in public life in those difficult years of the first half of the 1900s – a man always willing to help the underdog.

Thanks to Bonnie Humphreys' (President of Harcourt Valley Landcare) involvement in the Central Victorian Banksia Network, we are fortunate to have Dr Adam Miller visit to present his findings about the future for the Silver Banksia which was once prolific in this area, particularly on Mount Alexander.

Dr Adam Miller

Senior Lecturer, Centre for Integrative Ecology, School of Life and Environmental Sciences, Faculty of Science Engineering & Built Environment

Interests: Ecological genetics and genomics, wildlife conservation and environmental restoration, pest control, environmental stress and adaptation research

Dr Miller completed his PhD at Deakin University in 2006, and worked as a postdoctoral research fellow with the Centre for Environmental Stress and Adaptation Research group at The University of Melbourne, before joining the not-for-profit organisation Nature Glenelg Trust in 2015, and finally being appointed as a senior lecturer with the Centre for Integrative Ecology at Deakin University in 2017. His research has a primary focus on the ecological genetics of Australian wildlife, and the application of genetic and genomic tools for improving the management of threatened, commercially important, and pest species. He has a particularly keen interest in the evolution and conservation of rare, threatened, and ecologically important species, where he routinely draws on molecular methods to assess evolutionary trajectories to help inform conservation management.

Harcourt Bowling Club

Can you Help?

The Harcourt Lions Club has been working closely with the Castlemaine Secondary College to create a new Youth Development Program aimed at engaging and educating our secondary school students in a working and Community environment. The program will provide safe, caring, structured, and practical hands on experience in the Harcourt Community, between April and September 2018.

Students will be transported to Harcourt every Friday between 9am – 12 noon in Term 2 and 3 to partake in a variety of work experiences. For example, building and construction works at the Victorian Miniature Railway (VMR); Barista & catering work at Goldfields Café; planting and landscaping work at VMR; grape picking/pruning with local wineries.

During Term 1, the students will be involved in workplace safety training to prepare them for working in the Community. They will meet the local businesses and Community groups to get an understanding of the work experience options and to select their preferred activities. They will then complete the necessary inductions. The number of students wishing to be involved in the program exceeds the number of volunteers we need to supervise them in the Community. So we will only be able to offer the program to 15 students, unless we have more volunteers from the local businesses and Community prepared to help us provide more opportunities to these students. We also need volunteers for just 1 - 2 hours a week over 5 weeks, to assist the selected students to complete course enrolments, medical authorities, consent forms and all the paperwork that goes with undertaking a work experience placement off Campus. Volunteers will need to provide or complete a Working with Children Check and Induction as well as confirm what time they can commit to the program.

Blume's Bakery update

David and Jodie Pillinger are maintaining the pace of restoration of Blume's Bakery on the corner of Harmony Way and Victoria Street. Their passion is evident: as they progress with the restoration they are continually researching the history of the buildings, finding more information and using that to inform the style, materials and quality of the work.

In late February and early March tuck-pointing of the brickwork of the bakery oven and bakery internal walls should be complete. It is astonishing to learn of the lengths that David and Jodie have gone to. When they realised the oven chimney was collapsing, all the sand above the oven (which gives thermal mass to the oven) was removed to give access so the chimney could be repaired. The sand will be replaced soon. The bakery has a wooden ceiling; this is being kept and will be cleaned, repaired and re-surfaced as will the brick walls once the tuck-pointing is complete. They have even decided to keep and restore the original screen door into the bakery room.

The oven floor is about to be re-laid with fire bricks and in order to get the best baking results they have decided to have sensors placed in between the bricks. These give feedback about the oven heat across the whole floor. The sensors are used in smelting and other high heat manufacturing processes, so are strong enough to withstand the heat in a baker's oven which is fired by wood.

At the rear of the bakery is a galvanised shed which is extremely interesting as its timber frame is external to the walls instead of being on the inside. Jodie and David have had it confirmed that this was the original meeting hall for Harcourt. It was known as the "Town Hall" and also functioned as the ANA building until the existing ANA building on High Street was built. Apple Harvest at Thompson's Orchard

Harvesting is in full swing in Harcourt's Thompson's Orchard. Up to 50 people have been employed in picking and carting apples and removing and replacing nets.

The first variety of apple to come off the trees is the Royal Gala and by March 2, approximately 1300 bins will have been removed.

"Musk Lorikeets are in plague proportions," said Orchard Manager Milo Bilton. "We have been removing all the early Fuji apples which aren't netted because otherwise we lose from 30% to 50% of the crop due to bird damage. The early Fujis which were netted were of excellent quality with good sugar levels and all were unmarked.

The Red Delicious and/or the Standard Fuji apples will be coming off next and finally the Pink Lady apples will be picked. We'll probably start on them in about six weeks" he said.

Thompson's fruit is transported to Shepparton and packed there. The company has contracts with every supermarket chain in Australia.

Abandoned tyres form a breeding ground for vermin, tyres can decay and contaminate soil and groundwater, and a tyre fire generates toxic smoke and is difficult to extinguish.

EPA regulations allow storage of waste tyres if you have a genuine use for them, but urges you to dispose of unused waste tyres in landfill or at a recycling facility.

Grow Great Fruit Tips for Late Summer

As summer starts to fade to autumn, we can start to think about summer pruning of apricots and cherries. These trees are particularly prone to fungal disease, and it can minimise the risk of exposing the trees to disease by pruning them in the warm, still weather of autumn rather than in cold, wet winter weather. Make sure your secateurs are very sharp and clean; particularly if they've been used on diseased trees (it's easy to clean them in a 1:10 solution of bleach, or wipe the blades with eucalyptus oil). Some people recommend painting the pruning cuts, but we've found it preferable just to let the cuts dry naturally.

Here are our top three tips for successful fruit growing in March:

- 1. If you've drape netted your trees, get the nets off as soon as you've picked the fruit. The heavy nets can weigh down the growing tips of your trees, and make it harder to prune them into a good shape.
- 2. If you want to try growing your own peach trees this year (and save lots of money at the nursery!), now is a good time to be saving peach seeds. We usually use clingstone peaches, but any peach will do. At this stage all you need to do is save the seed every time you eat a peach just let the flesh rot off them (maybe store them outside). Then store the seeds in damp sand, keep them moist over winter, and they'll be ready to plant out next spring.
- 3. Pears are one of the few fruit to pick before they're ripe, and then ripen off the tree (some varieties can go floury if you ripen them on the tree). However, you still need to make sure they're mature before you pick them. A great way to tell is to cut one open and look at the seeds – they should be dark brown and plump.
