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
# Anzac Day 2023

**T**he 25th of April is observed nationally as the anniversary of the 1915 landing by the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps on the Gallipoli peninsula in the Dardanelles.

At Harcourt, the 2023 commemoration had a distinctly local emphasis. Following afternoon tea at Harcourt Heritage Centre a crowd, estimated at 100, marched behind the pipes and drums of Castlemaine George Milford and Diane Dooley Highland Pipe Band to the present wreaths war memorial in Stanley Park. In his opening remarks, the chairman of Harcourt Heritage Centre, George Milford, spoke of the district's losses in the Gallipoli campaign.



Harcourt's cenotaph was originally erected to honour those who fell in the Great War, however, it also shows the names of those who served in WWII. The cenotaph is surrounded by memorials to those from Harcourt who died in war, including the Vietnam War.



Colonel Robert Gartside and two members of the Facey family (Roy and Joseph) were killed in action at Gallipoli.

### **Harcourt Remembers the ANZACS**

A third member of the Facey family was shot in the eye at Gallipoli, invalided home, only to die three years later. Thomas Facey, though a casualty at Gallipoli, was buried in Harcourt Cemetery.

Harcourt's Colonel William James became seriously ill as he was evacuated from Gallipoli and was returned home. After he recovered, he returned to the front and was twice decorated for his bravery. William James' grandson (Ron James) wore his grandfather's medals to the Harcourt observance, with the DSO in pride of place.

The little community of Harcourt was understandably shocked at the losses sustained in the Great War, both at Gallipoli and in Europe. To surround the grieving families with support, it was arranged to plant memorial trees in the newly laid out Stanley Park, each tree having a granite marker dedicated to a fallen soldier. This was done in a community gathering before the end of the Great War. It was a really thoughtful kindness to families that had not been able to farewell their menfolk with a funeral and could not visit their graves.

In sombre mood, a number of wreaths from community groups and individuals were placed at the WWI memorial.

In another local touch, Linda McNeill played a saxophone rendition of 'Last Post' and 'Rouse' before taking up the violin to play Australia's national anthem.

The Harcourt Heritage Committee is especially grateful to the Castlemaine Highland Pipe Band, Castlemaine RSL Sub-branch, to Kirshy McAinch and to Linda McNeill for their help with a solemn and moving ANZAC Day observance in Harcourt

## Bendigo Electorate to Benefit from Cheaper Medicines

Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters MP welcomes changes which will allow some patients requiring routine medication to buy two months' worth of medicine for the price of a single prescription.

The Labor Government has announced changes to pharmacy dispensing that will ease cost of living pressures and make hundreds of common medicines cheaper.

From September 1, patients with a Medicare card will save up to \$180 a year if their medicine is eligible for 60-day prescribing and concession card holders will save up to \$43.80 a year per medicine.

The first tranche will include 113 medicines including for conditions like heart disease, cholesterol, Crohn's disease and hypertension.

Once implemented, the 60-day prescribing policy will provide doctors with the option to prescribe a two-month supply of 325 medicines on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) to Australians with stable, ongoing conditions. The current dispensing limit for these medications is

for a one-month supply only.

Introducing 60-day prescribing for stable, ongoing conditions was a recommendation of the clinical experts at the independent Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee (PBAC) in 2018. These changes were not implemented under the previous Government, costing Australians billions.

These changes will bring Australia into line with New Zealand, the United Kingdom, France, and Canada where patients already have access to multiple month medications on a single prescription.

This expands on the Federal Government's commitment to make medicines cheaper following the reduction of the PBS general co-payment on January 1. To date, this has saved people in the Bendigo electorate an estimated \$311,263. Federal Member for Bendigo Lisa Chesters said, 'In the Bendigo electorate, where local bulk billing rates are at crisis-level and the average out of pocket cost to see a doctor is

\$36.79, these changes will mean that some people can visit their GP less frequently to get a script refilled, saving time and money.

'Our pharmacists are a valued partner in delivering primary health services and every dollar saved by the Government will be reinvested straight back into community pharmacies to secure the ongoing strength of the sector.'

## Walking Harcourt's Town Centre

Members of the Harcourt Progress Association set out with a Council representative to take a walk to test a link from the centre of Harcourt township with the kindergarten, school, leisure centre, the Cooperative and the railway.

Mount Alexander Shire Council would like to thank Harcourt residents for sharing their time and thoughts recently as we continue to build our understanding of the issues and opportunities for the town centre.

Last month, our Heritage and Urban Design Officer spent time with members of the Harcourt Progress Association and Mount Alexander Disability Advocacy Group, walking the streets and visiting the playgroup to chat to parents and observe after school pick up routines.

Information gathered from residents during this time will help to further inform future work to improve Harcourt's footpath and cycle networks.

The project forms part of the Harcourt

Town Centre Action Plan, which focuses on ten key actions to help us prioritise projects, allocate development contributions and seek funding opportunities. The plan will seek to give Harcourt a heart whilst retaining the open relaxed atmosphere that meshes well with the surrounding landscape.

Consultation for the draft Harcourt Town Centre Vision document is now closed. We will be collating the feedback

and preparing the final document for adoption in the coming months.

There will be further opportunities for information and to provide feedback on each project as they are scoped. Over early May, this will include consultation on a key action of the vision: 'Making High Street a high street' and the proposed rezoning of land in the town centre to commercial.

#### Towards Makarrata

Makarrata is 'coming together after a struggle, facing the facts of wrongs and living again in peace.'

### Reconciliation

Reconciliation Week will run from May 27 - June 4 following Sorry Day on May 26.

This year's reconciliation week theme is:

'Be a voice for generations. Act today for a reconciled tomorrow'

The theme hints at an important question being put to us in a referendum this year, and also invites us to consider these ideas from multiple perspectives.

On March 24 of 2023, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese announced the question to be asked at the upcoming referendum:

A proposed law: To alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. Do you approve this proposed alteration?

At a federal level Australia does not currently have an advisory body of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people regarding laws and policies that impact them. While the Voice's composition, functions, powers and procedures can be changed by successive governments, its existence would be enshrined. This means that unlike previous government bodies such as ATSIC, this body can be changed but not readily scrapped, and successive governments can be held to account by the people.

In hearing diverse voices with diverse platforms, the asking of one question results in the asking of many more. The Referendum prompts us to enrich our personal understanding and our deeper social and cultural fabric.

Although Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are under-represented in this referendum, this is about their voice and hearing what is being asked. We are called to listen and grow our understanding of the complex history of the long journey towards reconciliation across this vast continent.

Lilla Watson, activist, academic and artist, often credited with the following words, attributed these to the collective voice of an Aboriginal Rights group in Queensland in the early 1970s she was part of:

If you have come here to help me, you are wasting your time. But if you have come because your liberation is bound up with mine, then let us work together.

Systemic and institutional racism continues in homes, workplaces, schools, legal systems and other institutions. Assimilation is still often confused for reconciliation. White supremacy and colonisation continue.

We live on the lands of the oldest surviving cultures in the world, with deeply held laws and customs. Pre-colonisation this continent had over 250 distinct language groups. First Peoples have lived here for over 65,000 years, or from a First Nations perspective - time immemorial.

Reconciliation embraces the rich connectedness embedded

in First People's notions of 'Country' which includes the living systems that we ultimately depend on. It is in our interest to listen to First Custodians of these un-ceded lands we tread, honouring Country, responding to climate change, and living sustainably.

The Uluru Statement From The Heart calls for an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice to be embedded in the Constitution and a Makarrata Commission to guide Truth Telling and bring us closer to Treaty. Importantly, reconciliation occurs at every level of government and society and the journey to Voice, Treaty and Truth may not be so linear.

In May 2021, in Victoria a formal Truth Telling process, The Yoorook Justice Commission was established. Further work is being done through the First People's Assembly towards Treaty.

In 1987, a Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody was established. We are yet to see all recommendations followed with ongoing disproportionate Aboriginal deaths in custody.

The Bringing Them Home Report was tabled in Federal Parliament on 26 May 1997. Twenty-six years on and twelve years since the National Apology, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children are still 10.6 times more likely than non-Indigenous children to be removed from their families.

Our actions do not only affect First Nations People but ultimately, all of us. Here is a call to non-First Nations People to amend personal constitutions considering one's own culture, history, future responsibilities and possibilities. In this way we can be a better voice for generations and act today for a reconciled tomorrow.

## Harcourt Valley Landcare Call to Action

Concerned community members are invited to get active in a local campaign to protect Harcourt's natural values in the proposed areas of housing development in Harcourt throughout the strategic planning process. As a result of successful depositions to a government Planning Panel in 2022 by Landcare, Stage 1 of a biodiversity audit has been completed. This stage included a desktop review of existing studies and published literature as well as brief site visits. Landcare is now calling on the Council to commit to Stage 2 of the audit (a detailed, on-ground study of the ecology), which Landcare considers critical to gain an understanding of what Harcourt has to protect. At the time of writing it's unclear whether this decision will be made at the 16 May Council meeting or the 20 June meeting.

Whether Stage 2 continues or not, there is plenty of work to be done to ensure Harcourt is developed in a way that benefits our community's environment, health and wellbeing – and we'd like your help to do it! Our group has been keeping Council on their toes for four years on this issue so let's not stop now. Can you help?

We encourage concerned residents of Harcourt and our shire to:

#### Landcare calls on Council to align Plan Harcourt with the Council's declaration of a Climate Crisis

Some background: In 2014 the Victorian government identified Harcourt as an area which could support population growth. In response the Shire developed the strategic planning process Plan Harcourt which commenced in 2018. In 2019 the Shire declared a climate crisis and in 2021 Harcourt Valley Landcare called on the Council to align Plan Harcourt so it addressed the declared climate crisis.

After a lengthy consultation process with the community, the amended Plan Harcourt

document went before a Planning Panel in 2022. The panel review handed down two major recommendations, one to do with the amount of commercial land and the other, which is Landcare's concern, was that development in the proposed areas could not go ahead without a biodiversity audit. The audit commenced in April 2023. A review of this type can consist of two stages: a desktop review with brief visits, followed by Stage 2 which entails detailed on-ground assessments and monitoring of identified and possibly previously unidentified ecological assets, however, it is not a guaranteed action within the biodiversity review process. The Council has the power to decide whether the critical second stage will go ahead. At the time of writing the decision date is not known, it could be at the Council meeting of May 16 or June 20.

Bron Willis, Landcare member said, 'This is Harcourt's opportunity to do something about climate change, which is intertwined with biodiversity loss. The strategic planning process may seem complicated and drawn out, but the decisions that it makes will affect Harcourt's ecological values forever. These values deserve to be protected, preserved and enhanced. We are not against development, but it needs to be the kind which respects the environment and enhances the health and wellbeing of everyone who lives here.'

Bron calls for Council to:

- Commit to Stage 2 of the biodiversity assessment (on-ground surveys by ecologists)
- Protect and buffer:
  - ► Habitat and corridors for the Brushtailed Phascogale
  - ► Key waterways Barkers Creek and Picnic Gully Creek, which will provide critical habitat corridors for animals moving through the landscape in a warming climate
  - ► Large, old trees that provide critical habitat for hollow-nesting species
  - ► Roadside vegetation on Elys Lane, Douglas Lane, Leafy Lane, Craigie St and Eagles Rd through a larger buffer zone
  - ► locally vulnerable species (including plants such as Hoary Sunray and Silver Banksia) and declining woodland birds, not just those threatened statewide or nationally
- **Deliver** on their 2019 declaration of a climate emergency, in which Council vowed to consider climate change as a high priority in every decision they make.

#### How can you help?

Join your fellow Harcourtians and Landcare members to ensure that Council makes the right decisions for Harcourt, both in the leadup to the decision for a Stage 2 biodiversity assessment and beyond.

**Skills welcome**: writing and communication skills, town planning skills, environmental expertise, experience with lobbying government, willingness to review government guidelines and protocols and a desire to protect Harcourt's environment.

Debra Watson, Maldon Primary School Business Manager, said: 'Our school doesn't have an EFTPOS facility so the ability to borrow one for fundraising events is awesome. It enables volunteers to collect money on

the spot rather than waiting for attendees to go and get cash or do a bank transfer. It also means that the school inevitably makes more money on our silent auction items as attendees have the ability to pay using a card rather than cash – after all who carries cash these days? Thank you Maldon & District Community Bank for making the lives of our volunteers easier!'

# Victorian Electoral

## Didn't Vote in the State Election?

Close to 300,000 Victorians who appear to have failed to vote in the

November 2022 State election will have an opportunity to explain why they didn't vote when they receive an 'Apparent failure to vote notice' in the coming days.

Acting Electoral Commissioner, Dana Fleming, says the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is urging people who receive a notice to respond with a detailed explanation, as the VEC is required to issue a fine of \$92 if a person fails to respond within 28 days.

'An 'Apparent failure to vote notice' is not a fine – it's a chance to explain why you appear not to have voted,' Ms Fleming said. 'If you respond to the notice, you are much more likely to be excused.

'Completing and sending the notice back to us within the 28-day timeframe gives us a chance to consider your explanation and whether you can be excused.'

Voting in State elections is compulsory in Victoria.

The VEC worked to make voting in the 2022 State election as convenient and accessible as possible by:

- increasing the number of early voting centres by 50% (to 155)
- extending voting hours during the early voting period
- offering telephone assisted voting for those who are blind, have low vision

or a physical disability and were unable to vote without assistance, or people impacted by the Victorian floods.

The option to vote by post was also available to all electors, and a drive-through voting centre was offered to COVID positive voters who were unable to vote in the last 3 days of the election and hadn't voted early or applied for a postal vote before applications closed.

The VEC also sent VoterAlert reminders by SMS and email to 2.5 million enrolled voters who had provided their contact details. Voters can sign up for VoterAlert at any time to be reminded to vote in all future State and local council elections at: vec.vic.gov.au/VoterAlert



## Harcourt CFA National Emergency Medal Presentation

Saturday 1 April was the designated day for presentation of National Emergency Medals

to over 400 volunteers and CFA staff in District 2, which includes the Harcourt Brigade, for their efforts in the 2019-2020 Australian bushfire crises. This included the fires that devastated East Gippsland, North Eastern Victoria as well as in NSW. Seven Harcourt fire brigade members were recognised for their contribution and presented with their medal at the ceremony held at the J B Osbourne Theatre in Kangaroo Flat. and techniques in dealing with a LPG cylinder fire in a safe and controlled environment. Three levels of spill fires can be simulated as well as being able to add a safety valve fire and a rupture fire. The prop is housed in a self-contained container which allows it to be moved around the state as needed, and this prop complements the existing Domestic, Small Industry and Car Props, which we have utilised in the past.



#### Other Activities

On 30 March the brigade was paged to support the Lockwood brigade to a truck leaking diesel at the Ravenswood Service Station. This was followed up with the brigade turning out to a fire during the Fire Danger Period (FPD) on 5 April in Ravenswood South, and the third incident for the month was to the Victoria Road/Calder Freeway on/off ramps at the roundabout for a reported oil spill. Fortunately, what was thought to be oil turned out to be grapes that had fallen from a trailer, and they were quickly washed off the road, before following the trail to the north end of Coolstore Road to deal with more of the load.

#### Home Fire Safety

With the approaching cooler weather, fire safety around the home focuses on the methods of home heating we use. Whether we use wood, gas, electric or any other alternatives for heating, it is important that it is in good condition and maintained as per manufacturers' recommendations. Having a home fire safety plan with a designated evacuation meeting point and working smoke alarms are also important things to have for the safety benefit of you and your family. If you do not have these, then do not put it off for another day, but act now!

## Mountain Bike Park Upgrade and Repairs

The La Larr Ba Gauwa Committee of Management would like to introduce their new committee members and update the community on repairs to the Park after the 2022 storms and the upcoming works within the Park.

The new committee comprises returning members, Jason Tolland, Michael Scott and Jane McQueenie and new members Jo Wall, Hugh Finlay, Trent Gibson, Terry Willis, Nick Byrne and Alex Wells. The committee would like to thank departing members Janine McCarthy, Andrew Nicholas and David Ling, Alexander Robert and Rosie Annear for their service. The new committee has been meeting monthly since April 2022. In exciting news, in 2021, the committee successfully received a grant of \$200,000 from the Victorian Government, as part of its \$105.6 million dollar investment into Victoria's Great Outdoors. Specifically, this funding comes from the Camping and Caravans grant stream and is be used for campground improvements and construction of associated recreation infrastructure at the La Larr Ba Gauwa Park.

The purpose of these works is to formalise campground areas, protect the Oaks and Cypress, to manage visitor



behaviour and impact, and to improve safety and amenity. The scope of the works will include:

- Protection of the Oaks and White Cypress forest areas from cars and caravans
- Designated campsites, toilet block and fire pits at the Oaks campground
- Formalising car parks for day visitors and campers
- Improvement of picnic areas
- Slowed and improved traffic flow for visitor safety.

These works will minimise encroachment on the Oaks, protect the Oak Forest and White Cyprus trees from disturbance, manage traffic to reduce soil compaction around the remaining White Cypress trees, manage toileting and disposal of toilet paper at the camp sites, provide safe and respectful parking and camping spaces, and reduce the impost of events on the Harcourt township.

All works will be guided by the Operational Environment Management Plan and the Cultural Heritage Management Plan, as well as planning approval and referral authorities.

The project will commence construction in the campground on Monday May 8 and continue for 3 to 4 weeks. During these weeks the Oaks





campground may be closed as heavy machinery will be operating in the area.

After the campground construction, there will be a trail repair crew working across the mountain bike trails that were damaged after the storms in October 2022.

The committee will provide regular updates on social media sites of Facebook and Instagram.

#### Repairs

The roadways, emergency access tracks and mountain bike trails were significantly impacted by the October 2022 storms.

Following the extensive storm damage and subsequent trail network closure, the La Larr Ba Gauwa Committee of Management has been working with the State Government DEECA, formerly DEWLP, to develop a staged plan and approach to repair and reopen the trails at the Park.

A local contractor completed repair of the emergency access tracks in March and we are in discussions with the State Government to secure funding focused on assisting volunteer Committees of Management to repair public assets damaged in the October 2022 floods and storms.

A specialist trail building and maintenance company has been identified to undertake the trail network repair. We will provide an update through *The Core*, social media and community networks when we are able to confirm when works will begin.

## Harcourt Heritage Centre JH Ely—A Spokesman for Harcourt.

Newspaper headlines in Melbourne's *The Argus, The Weekly Times* and Tasmania's *The Hobart Mercury* told their readers of the dire situation in Harcourt. Conditions for horticulture in 1938 were the worst ever experienced. The rainfall in the latter part of 1937 was insufficient to maintain a satisfactory amount of water in the subsoil. There was little run-off from the rains that fell on the catchments in January and February 1938.

The Coliban system reservoirs at Malmsbury and Upper Coliban fell to their lowest levels ever. No irrigation water reached Harcourt's orchards, and water for domestic use was severely curtailed. The lack of water affected the fruit trees, resulting in small fruit and early defoliation. It was as if autumn had started three months early.

In May 1938, a deputation to Premier Albert Dunstan sought assurance that the government would augment the Coliban water storages. Those who formed the deputation were Mrs Lillian Thompson, Colonel JH Lang, Colonel WE James, and JH 'Jim' Ely.

Mrs Thompson said that several Harcourt residents had left their homes as there was no drinkable water in their tanks! Mr Lang stated that many orchardists had been reduced to the breadline. Government assistance seemed out of reach. Colonel James pointed out that the Debt Adjustment Board seemed to be concealed behind an array of clerks (this remark drew a rebuke from the Premier.) Jim Ely told the Premier that it was only because they were faced with ruin that the growers were induced to apply to the government.

In reply, Mr Dunstan said that the government was intent on avoiding the problems of such severe droughts as had occurred in 1913-14 and 1937-38. There was talk of providing another reservoir at Shepherds Hut Creek at Lauriston, between Upper Coliban and Malmsbury Reservoirs. Mr Dunstan advised that the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission (SRWSC) had been testing foundations and sinking bores to identify a suitable dam site. A report was to be delivered by the SRWSC within a fortnight. Everything possible had to be done to keep primary producers on the land.

Jim Ely was well placed to act as spokesman for Harcourt. He was born in Harcourt in August 1885, the eldest son of George Ely, who was the eldest son of pioneer orchardist and 'father of Harcourt', Henry Ely. Jim Ely had many relatives in the valley, eleven brothers and sisters, more than twenty uncles and aunts and a host of first cousins. Jim Ely was related to some of Harcourt's largest family groups – the Warren, Leversha and Gartside families. His marriage, in 1911, to Frances Pritchard further extended the family network: his father-in-law was Councillor Ed Pritchard.

Jim Ely was a member (and often an officeholder) of the Harcourt School Committee, the Harcourt Football Club, the Rechabite Lodge and the Harcourt Cooperative Fruitgrowers Association, He was a director of Harcourt Coolstores Ltd and a member of the Coliban Investigation Committee.

Jim Ely assisted in organising a Queen Carnival\* as a fundraiser for the swimming pool, his daughter being an entrant in the competition. It was Jim Ely who had the vision of a retail area on what is now Harmony Way, purchasing a large, late-Victorian homestead from Ravenswood, positioning half as a private residence at 50 High Street and relocating the other half as a cafe and boarding house.

The cafe/boarding house was taken over by the Moxom family (it is now the Harcourt Produce and General Store).

Jim Ely then conducted a small fruit shop between the garage and the Calder Bridge (over Barkers Creek). In 1948 he made the fruit shop available to the scout troop as a meeting place. In 1952 trustees for the Scout Association formally acquired the place. It remained in use until the Scout Hall was established in its present Eagles Road location.

As a grandson of pioneer fruit grower Henry Ely, it was perhaps inevitable that Jim Ely would become an orchardist. His orchard was at 3379 Harmony Way, now the home of Black Jack Wines. Probate records of JH Ely's father suggest that Jim Ely also had an interest in land at the north-west corner of Eagles Road and Frost Lane. In later life, Jim Ely retired to a brick home at 15 Buckley Street in Harcourt.

Jim Ely was also a gold miner His most successful venture was to operate

a hydraulic sluicing claim in the vicinity of a dam on the east-facing slope in what is now Black Jack vineyard. The water for the claim was drawn from the Specimen Gully channel which wound its way around the contours above Jim Ely's orchard. When the water was not available (as in 1938), Jim Ely sank some deep shafts into the solid stone of the ridge immediately above and to the west of his orchard. Having recovered payable gold in the sluicing claim, he was hopeful of striking it rich on the nearby hillside. We will never know if he was successful. The shafts dug by Jim Ely were long abandoned in the 1950s.

The Argus reported in March 1938 that the great apple industry of Harcourt had been ruined because of the shortage of water.

Soon afterwards it was announced that funds would be allocated for construction of the new Lauriston Reservoir. In May 1944 Jim Ely commended the Dunstan Ministry for building the Lauriston Weir, otherwise Harcourt orchardists would have been in a sorry plight.

Lauriston lies in a deep valley between the huge Upper Coliban Reservoir and the Malmsbury Reservoir. All three storages provide water to Bendigo and Castlemaine. During the millennial drought (2000 to 2010) the immense Upper Coliban Reservoir dried to a muddy puddle. Water from Malmsbury Reservoir was pumped back into Lauriston because, being in a deep valley, there would be less surface area and thus reduced loss by evaporation. By this action, the population of central Victoria was supplied with water until the drought broke on 4 September 2010.

Every reader of *The Core* is indebted to folk such as Jim Ely who, in 1938 pressed the Victorian Government to build the Lauriston Reservoir.

Throughout his adult life, Jim Ely was a consistent and effective worker and advocate for Harcourt.





# Harcourt Granite Grand Buildings of Bendigo

Mount Alexander is a granite mass and in 1997, in a Geological Survey report for Victoria, it was reported to have six quarries, five of which were still working, however it was also reported that the mount had thirteen other abandoned quarries. The use of Harcourt granite in monuments and buildings in Australia is widespread. In the same report, it was stated that Harcourt granite is found in buildings in every major city in Australia, much of it from the late 1800s and through the twentieth century.

#### Sacred Heart Cathedral

The foundation stone of the cathedral was set in place on Friday June 25, 1897. Foundations of granite were constructed for the whole building, although only the nave and side aisles were to be built. The cathedral was opened with grand celebrations on 29 September 1901.

The Mount Alexander Mail reported in March 1897:

A goodly number of men are now employed at the local granite quarries, the proprietor, Mr. Blight, having secured an important contract to supply the stone for the new Roman Catholic Cathedral to be erected in Bendigo.'

A walk around the outside of the cathedral reveals the immensity of the granite work. This contract brought secure employment to many Harcourt families for four years around the turn of the century.

The second construction stage began on October 16, 1955 with Cardinal Gilroy officiating. The Trapp family of Austria (and *The Sound of Music*) sang during Mass. Cardinal Freeman consecrated the completed cathedral on 14 May, 1977.

#### Alexandra Fountain



The fountain was built in 1881 as the gift of George Lansell. It was named for the then-Princess of Wales by her two sons, Prince Albert Victor and Prince George (later King George V). It was built on the banks of the Bendigo Creek, with foundations that go down four metres to support the twenty tonnes of Harcourt granite.

The design was by WC Vahland, the well-known architect of many significant buildings in Bendigo. The stonework was by Peter Finn & Co. The turned and polished bowl of the fountain, reputedly the largest in the southern hemisphere, is three metres in diameter and

fourteen inches thick, supported on a granite disc 2.4 metres in diameter and more than 30 centimetres thick.

#### Other Civic Buildings of Bendigo

Pillars of Harcourt Granite can be seen at the former Post Office, the Law Courts and the Town Hall and have contributed to Bendigo's nationwide reputation as a boom-time city. Turned and polished granite pillars give a classic finish to the façade of the Bendigo Town Hall, designed by WC Vahland in 1885. The pillars were turned and polished by Peter Hoey Finn at his steam polishing works just a short distance away in Lyttleton Terrace.

## Katie Finlay's Fruit Growing Tips

## Prepare the Soil to Plant Fruit Trees



Hi everyone

It's hard to believe, but it's already time to be thinking about which new fruit trees you want to plant this winter. (And yes, we're assuming everyone can squeeze another fruit tree in somewhere <sup>(2)</sup>) Not sure what to plant? Start by having a think about this summer. Did you pick as much fruit as you wanted from your garden? Did you have to buy fruit that you could have grown yourself? If you've got even a little bit of a green thumb and a bit of time to give your fruit trees, it's really not that hard to harvest some fruit from your garden. And you can be sure that the fruit you grow yourself will be more delicious,

It's too early to be planting yet, but if you are thinking of planting fruit trees it's a good idea to do some soil preparation first. This helps to give your trees the best possible start in life. One of the best ways to improve your soil is to plant a winter-active green manure crop. New research shows that if you include at least five different species in the green manure (grasses, cereals, brassicas, chenopods and legumes) it can produce much better results. Here's a list to inspire you:


Alfalfa (lucerne), Amaranth, Beetroot, Broad bean, Buckwheat, Butterfly pea, Chia, Cocksfoot, Corn, Dill, Endive, Fenugreek, Kidney beans, Lab lab bean, Linseed, Medic, Millet, Mung bean, Mustard, Purslane, Quinoa, Radish, Rocket, Sesame, Soybean, Sunflower, Turnip, Vetch.

The rule of thumb is the more different types of seed, the merrier. You can either buy an autumn green manure seed mix from a nursery, or buy the individual seeds to make up your own mix. Try to use organic, untreated seed if possible. We've had the autumn break, and it's raining as I write this - you shouldn't have to water the crop.

Go ahead and plant the seed wherever you intend to plant your fruit trees, but you need to do it ASAP. The best time to plant your new trees is when they're dormant, usually from late June right through until about mid-August. That means there should still be enough time to get a green









manure crop growing and tall enough to be fit for purpose, which is solely to add organic bulk and nutrients back into the soil. The longer the crop has to grow before it's turned in, the better. Once it's grown you can either dig the green manure into the soil (which is best), or just cut it down and leave it lying on the surface. If you're digging it in, you need to leave a gap of at least a couple of weeks until you plant the trees, because the green manure can get quite hot as it breaks down.

If you don't have the time or capacity to plant a green manure crop, it doesn't matter at all! Don't let your lack of soil preparation stop you planting trees this year. You could add some well-made compost or aged manure when you plant the trees. If you can't manage that, it's much better to just plant trees into whatever soil you have and work on the soil improvement later, rather than miss another year of getting your future fruit supply started.

Carr's Organic Fruit Tree Nursery (one of the businesses here on our farm) is once again selling trees grown right here in Harcourt, to suit Harcourt soil and conditions. We have a great range, with more than 250 different varieties and combinations available this year. We specialise in heritage apples, multigraft trees (with more than one variety of the same fruit type) and fruit salad trees (more than one type of fruit on the same tree).

We encourage everyone in Harcourt to plant a heritage apple variety! We're trying to preserve as many old varieties as possible, before they completely disappear. You will be able to collect your trees from our Nursery Open Days on the last weekend of June and the first weekend of July (all the details are in the checkout section).

As fruit fly has been found in Harcourt again this season; just a reminder that we offer free fruit fly resources in our online shop. If you'd rather try growing your own trees from scratch than buying them from a nursery, then now is a great time to collect fresh apple, pear and quince seed. The seeds will produce large seedling rootstocks that are tough and resilient, and perfect for grafting your favourite variety on to. Once you've collected the seed, store it in damp sand over winter, ready to plant out next spring.


## **Exploring The Coliban Main Channel**



In late 2022, a fellow member of a local Facebook History Group posted an intriguing photo (shown above) of a structure that had once been part of the Coliban Main Channel, which conveys water to the city of Bendigo from the upper Coliban River and its series of reservoirs. The structure is an example of a wooden flume that once transported water above and across gullies encountered at regular intervals along the course of the channel as it winds its way over some 70 kilometres between Malmsbury Reservoir and its destination (these days Sandhurst Reservoir at Big Hill Bendigo). The photo is dated 1894 and is one of a series taken by M. Law of scenic sites in Central Victoria, his wife and an assistant often appearing (as they are here) in these photos at various localities.

In this case a location had been given, 'Whisky Gully near Mount Alexander'. Being an ardent bushwalker or more accurately, 'rambler' I immediately decided to search for its location, and to take a photograph of how the scene looks today from where I thought M. Law had stood. And so, this is how obsessions start.

Over the following weeks on the State Library website I discovered more historic photos taken of the early features of the Main Channel (which had been built during the 1870s). I then set out to discover the locations of these old photos and to photograph what remained of these features. It wasn't long before I discovered, via Trove, a number of detailed newspaper articles written about



the channel system at the time of its

construction. These articles give an in depth description of the channel and the country it flows through. The photos and articles are so vivid and evocative I hope that, by collecting them in a book, I'm able to convince both lovers of history and of bushwalking to follow the course of the Coliban Main Channel with a new appreciation of what lies before their eyes.

The book *Exploring the Coliban Main Channel, through historical news items and photos* can be purchased at various outlets in Castlemaine, including Stonemans Bookshop and the Castlemaine Visitor Information Centre, Mostyn Street. It's also available at the Harcourt Heritage Centre, 7 High Street Harcourt.

## Weather & Water



April proved to be generally warmer overnight than usual and many people remarked on the Indian summer we had the good fortune to

enjoy. Sunny days with mild temperatures prevailed for most of school holidays and proved to be good for outdoor activities. The Thursday before Easter and Good Friday, were the days



when the heaviest rain for the month fell with 34 mm received over the two days.

Rainfall for April was 86 mm which brought the cumulative total for the year to 169.5 mm. This is very acceptable: while it falls below the mark for the years 2020 - 2022, it is far better than 2019 with a cumulative total at the same time of 47.5 mm and 2018 with 75 mm.

The skies were busier than usual with a solar eclipse on 20 April and sightings of the Aurora Borealis.

The Aurora Australis made a spectacular show on 23 April and was captured by local resident, Slade Beard. The best time of the year to see it is from May to August and it is best to be as far south as possible. This event was unusual as it was seen in Victoria's far north, and in Perth. The aurora is a result of solar weather which is expected to peak this year.


