Upgrade for James Park



Members of the Heritage Centre: George Milford, Diana Cork, Ruth and Phil Hay were delighted to hear the news of a Tiny Towns Grant announced by MP Maree Edwards in May.

Happiness is...

n May, Heritage Centre members were very happy to Lhear that they were successful in securing a Tiny Towns Grant, of \$50,000 which among other things, will be used to remove the dangerous and

unsightly drain in James Park.

The grant was announced by Maree Edwards MP on May 9. She said, 'Our smallest communities are the beating heart of this region, and I know how important this funding is to complete projects that make a real difference.'

George Milford said, 'The grant will be used not only to remove the drain and level that area, but also includes another safety measure: the installation of power bollards which will reduce the

number of trailing power leads and increase the amenity of the space for stalls. The added advantage of removing the drain is that there will be more accessible space for any activity held in the park.'

Maree added that 'Victoria's Labor Government has supported nearly 350 projects over two rounds, via the Tiny Towns Grant.' The work for this grant will be carried out by the Shire.

In Mount Alexander Shire six towns received money in the recent round.

The Heritage Centre as most will be aware, runs the Applefest and related Art Show and has taken on the oversight of Gather Harcourt events. The ANZAC day commemoration is also organised by the centre. The Shire has provided a grant in its most recent budget for fencing of the park due to its regular use for events. While the Applefest has moved to the Leisure Centre, the Shire's aim is to create the only outdoor concert venue in the Shire at Harcourt. Phil Hay noted that the Shire is working on plans for a permanent stage/sound shell in James Park.

Committee members expressed their thanks to the Shire for its recent proactive support. In particular, they mentioned Michael Annear, Director of Infrastructure and Development and Karen Evenett from the same department. Diana Cork explained: 'Before Applefest the Shire organised to fix a broken drain cover and to move the history story boards near the ANA Hall. These two actions improved safety and access to the site. The story boards were also given a facelift. Importantly, in time for ANZAC Day, council responded to the request to provide a bench seat near the cenotaph in Stanley Park.'

What is the new Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund?

The Victorian State Government has announced that from 1 July 2025, the existing Fire Services Property Levy (FSPL) will be replaced by the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF).

According to the information provided on the Department of Treasury and Finance's website the levy is intended to "support a broader range of emergency services and for the first time include VICSES, Triple Zero Victoria, the State Control Centre, Forest Fire Management Victoria and Emergency Recovery Victoria, as well as the Country Fire Authority (CFA) and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV)."

Department information goes on

to say, "Increasing frequency of fires, floods and storms continues to be a reality of life in Victoria. The new ESVF will make sure all our emergency services have the tools and resources they need to help keep Victorians safe. Every dollar raised will go towards vital lifesaving equipment, vehicles, staff, training for volunteers, community education, and recovery support to help Victorians when they need it most."

Current conditions for burn-offs due to the unseasonal weather has resulted in the CFA running an information campaign to remind the public of the potential heightened risks of burn-offs escaping and threatening nearby properties.

Since restrictions have been lifted, many brigades across the state have been called out to escaped burns, some spreading to nearby sheds, haystacks or neighbouring properties.

The drought conditions and gusty winds mean that conditions on many days are unsuitable for undertaking a burn-off. This is why proper planning and preparedness should be carried out before considering any burn-off. This will help in reducing the number of unnecessary callouts brigades are currently experiencing. Also, while not foolproof, registering your burn on 1800 688 511 should avoid the brigade being called out by mistake.

Busy Month for Callouts

May has been a busy month resulting in 13 callouts so far. This is well above the average. There have been seven primary and six support calls to a variety of fires and incidents. There have been grass fires, unregistered burning, alarms, a truck fire, vehicle accidents, assisting Ambulance Victoria with a patient lift, a flue/ceiling fire, a compost fire and a smell of gas.

As you can see, we can be called out to all sorts of emergencies, and this highlights the importance of maintaining our training skills across the full spectrum of possibilities. One interesting statistic is the number of calls we have that are on or near the Calder Freeway this year, including another four for May.

Winter Fire Risks

Winter is the traditional time for an increase in the number of house fires. Already there has been an increase in the number of chimney/flue fires as a result of them not being cleaned before they're used for the first time this year.

There are precautions that you can take to reduce the risk of house fires that are simple and easy to carry out. Also, the importance of having a home emergency plan cannot be overstated, and it needs to be current and reviewed each year. If you do not have one, or have not done a review, then make it a June priority. Stay safe and warm.

History Matters Exhibition

Local historical groups in Mount Alexander Shire have come together to present an exhibition called History Matters. The exhibition will be in Castlemaine's Historic Market Building from Friday 6 June until Sunday 15 June, including throughout the King's Birthday long weekend.

The exhibition features photographs, information and items that tell some of the many stories that make our region what it is. The theme 'History Matters' is a reminder to us all of the importance of knowing, understanding, sharing and protecting our history.

Some highlights will be goldmining in Maldon, photographs over the years at Newstead's Butter Factory, aerial photographs of Castlemaine across the decades, images of the historical Forest Street flood, an historic Monster Meeting flag, tales of surveyor and Taradale resident, William Swan Urquhart, and train transportation of Harcourt's apples.

Groups involved include: Castlemaine Historical Society, Castlemaine Pioneers and Old Residents, Chewton Domain Society, Harcourt Heritage, Maldon Museum and Archives, Newstead Historical



Society and Taradale Historical Group.

Each of these groups holds specialist material that relates to the events, places and people who have gone before in their area. The groups are volunteer-based, and always keen to welcome new volunteers with an interest or passion for the local history.

"Our local historical groups hold fascinating and important stories of our towns," said Donna Fearne, Mount Alexander Shire Council's Heritage Officer. "This new exhibition format will be a wonderful showcase for locals and visitors to the area. It will offer a snapshot of the Shire's history and a valuable way for our local historical groups to work together."

Harcourt Heritage Centre The Kitchen Table

Victorian Governor, The Hon Alex Chernov AC KC, visited Harcourt Heritage Centre in August 2012. During his tour of the museum the Governor lingered over many of the exhibits, worrying his Aide-de-Camp, who was concerned that the Governor was going to be late for his next appointment. But, not to be hurried, the Governor paused in the meeting room to say to the committee: "Look after those two Laminex-topped tables. Do you know how much such tables fetch in auction rooms in Melbourne? They are becoming a real curiosity."

Harcourt's Heritage Committee has never thought of these tables as a museum exhibit, but they do stir memories of a different lifestyle and changing fashions.

Those who grew up in the 1950s and 1960s will recall that every kitchen had a Laminex table with matching chairs. Only our grandparents had wooden tables with a linoleum or oil cloth top. Meals were always eaten at the kitchen table. One of the kids was asked to set the table. A check gingham or linen cloth was spread out with cutlery for every member of the family. In those days, before sliced bread came into the shops, there was always the breadboard and bread knife next to father's place at the table. At the end of the meal the kids asked permission to leave the table: "Can I leave the table?" was generally met with: "Please MAY I leave the table?" The last child left at the end of the meal had to clear the table, pick up the tablecloth carefully, take it to the back door and shake off all the bread crumbs for the waiting sparrows. (Yes, there were plenty of sparrows in those days.)

In his book "Australian Houses of the Forties and Fifties" Peter Cuffley tells us that: "Plastic laminates under the trade names 'Laminex' and 'Formica' came to symbolise the post war era. They were bright, easy-care materials, epitomising modernity." These new laminates were advertised in 'Home Beautiful' from July 1947. But it was in the mid-1950s that both Laminex and Formica became generally available in multiple patterns and colours.

Last week we upturned the two Laminex tables at the Heritage Centre but could find no maker's brand. It is probable that many factories set out to meet the growing demand. The name 'Namco' comes to mind. Sixty years ago, the production of both Formica and Laminex sheet was going gangbusters. Our house proudly boasts a Laminex-topped coffee table made as a high school woodwork project in 1960 or 1961. The main piece of furniture in our lounge is my wife's woodgrain Laminex buffet; a 21st birthday gift. A nest of three occasional tables features the same woodgrain patterned Laminex. Across Australia in the 1960s the Laminex glass-fronted buffet replaced the crystal cabinet as the place to show off pretty cups and saucers and the family crystal. As the 1960s progressed, the kitchen table gradually faded from preferred kitchen designs, to be replaced by curved dining counters (Laminex topped, of course). There would be few kitchens in the nation that do not feature Laminex benchtops.

In the course of my employment, during 1987 and 1988, I met a man named Andee Sellman, corporate whizkid and right-hand man to famous businessman Alan Jackson. This was at the time when my employer's parent company was BTR Nylex, a big conglomerate. Andee Sellman worked at a frantic pace. I recall his nervous energy during the periodic sessions when the finances of TKL were under review. Andee had devised a very strict system of financial reporting and profit planning. If memory serves me correctly. BTR Nylex had just acquired Laminex Industries for about \$1 billion. In due course Andee was appointed Managing Director of Laminex Industries. But this was a poisoned chalice, because BTR Nylex had paid far too much for Laminex and furniture fashions were changing. The new Managing Director had no success in managing a crippling debt. Andee Sellman's website tells us: "After experiencing the highs, lows, stresses and strains of the corporate world Andee went on the search for a better way of doing business and life. He transformed his personal and business life by developing and living his unique rest and rhythm philosophy." This philosophy requires Andee to walk 80 kilometres a week. I hope that Andee can rest a while at his kitchen table from time to time. But I will wager that Andee's table is not a Laminex-topped table, because it would hold painful memories of his struggles in the corporate world.



Every visitor to Harcourt Heritage Centre finds some item that stirs up recollections of the past. Who would have thought that such an exalted person as the State Governor would take an interest in the Laminex tables in the meeting room?

PARTNERSHIP TO BRING ART MUSEUM INTO A NEW ERA



The project to bring the iconic Castlemaine Art Museum building into a new era has taken a step forward. Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards today joined Mount Alexander Shire Council CEO Darren Fuzzard and Castlemaine Art Museum Acting Chair Mark Sheppard to announce that Council will lead the delivery of the redevelopment in partnership with the Museum and the Allan Labor Government.

The Labor Government has provided \$6 million to support the redevelopment of the heritage-listed 1931 building, including improved all-abilities access to the entrance, safeguarding of sensitive heritage elements and critical building improvements. This partnership will draw on Council's infrastructure expertise to lead the redevelopment.

With the Shire team now on board to manage the project, the timeline will be finalised and announcements on the next steps will follow in the months ahead.

Originally known as the Castlemaine Art Gallery and Historical Museum, the Gallery was founded in 1913 and moved into its purpose-built venue in 1931. It has one of the most important regional Victorian art collections including major and significant works from the 19th and 20th centuries, along with work by more recent modern and contemporary artists.

The museum also plays a significant role caring for cultural objects on behalf of the local Djaara and Dja Dja Wurrung community. The operations of the museum are also supported by the Victorian Government through Creative Victoria.

Joseph Young Drive: Potholes no more Thank you Parks Victoria

Three home-grown papers, including the *Faraday Farrago*, the *Chewton Chat* and *The Core* had recently highlighted the dangerous state of the road which runs north/south over Mount Alexander. The nub of the problem has been that no one government department has taken responsibility for this road.

Chris Thornhill, president of the Faraday Association wrote to Melissa Horne (State Minister for Roads and Road Safety) and forwarded copies to council and the Federal MLA, Lisa Chesters, regarding the lack of ownership and responsibility for the road and the delay in fixing problem potholes. When *The Core* rang council, a council officer rang back to say it was a council road (as reported in the May edition of *The Core*), so confusion reigned, even behind council walls.

In a letter dated May 28 from the Shire CEO, Chris received the news that showed the shire was determined to sort out the departmental responsibility. Before he

received this letter he approached the *Midland Express*, which on 3 June published a very terse, well documented article about the state of the road and lack of government action since 2004. Coincidentally, John Ellis of the *Chewton Chat* wrote to Parks Victoria and received a letter confirming that the problem of the potholes was to be immediately fixed.

Thanks to Parks Victoria, every pothole has been filled and sealed over, and the verges have been cleared of the overhanging vegetation, which had become a fire and access risk.

And we should also thank the unknown "artist" who wrote messages on the road surface warning of the dangers ahead and circled every pothole. That was a very succinct warning, and most likely saved cyclists from injuries and perhaps the loss of a life.

And now back to the problem of the Harcourt roundabout ...

Weather & Water

I searched back through my rainfall archives; it was as I expected: this May was the driest since I started records in 2008. The Bureau of Meteorology has indicated that the central Victorian region has received only 40% to 60% of the mean rainfall, which is shown as 100 mm to 200 mm.

Here at Reservoir Road we didn't make the 100 mm, with 98 mm received this year to date. The total rainfall for the month was 6 mm. The drying trend is shown in the figures of our reservoir storages (see the table).

Days at the start of May were warm and dry until 17 May when the temperature dipped to 12 degrees and clouds massed to the north, which did not live up to their promise, with a light shower and mist which did not register in the gauge. Up to 23 May there was a series of frosts with sunny days. There were light mists on 23 May with a temperature of 17 degrees. On Saturday May 24, we received 3.5 mm of rain after a lovely sunny morning. (twenty-eight days since any recordable rain). On 26 May, a wild dust storm which affected most of Victoria arrived in the late afternoon and 2.5 mm of rain was recorded. Temperatures dropped in the mornings with frosts and sunny days at the end of May.

Home gardens are suffering, as is

the bush. It is difficult to keep plants watered as the air has been so dry. I noticed water deliveries to rural properties in Harcourt.

Temperature predictions from the Bureau for June to August indicate warmer days and nights than usual across much of Australia.

As of 31 May the Bureau predicted that La Niña (wetter weather) is likely to emerge later in 2025, while noting that water storages in the southeastern states were 10 to 50% lower than the same time last year.

Community offer to acquire historic Hub building opens soon!

The Castlemaine Community Investment Co-operative is excited to announce the opening of its debenture offer to raise funds for the purchase of the Hub, a beloved landmark property in the heart of Castlemaine.

The offer will be open from 2 June to 29 June 2025.

The Co-operative is seeking investors to buy the Hub through fixed term loans called debentures. Investors will be able to support a vital community asset while earning a good annual return. As terms expire the Co-op will re-pay the debenture holders. "We project the building will be wholly community owned in around 20 years," said Director Gwen Hanna. "Funds raised will be used to acquire and maintain the building, ensuring it is a long-term home for



sustainability and environmental organisations, small businesses not always available in rural towns, and community-led action," she said.

The Hub holds significant historical and economic value for Castlemaine. Over its colourful history it has been a successful single-story pub, a grand two-story restaurant and boarding house, and in 2006 was bought by Neil and Heather Barratt as a home for local action on climate change. It has been substantially renovated, including with sustainability features, and is a successful business. By purchasing the Hub, the Co-op will:

- Preserve a cherished piece of local heritage
- Keep our wealth locally, and
- Continue to invest into the community for our future resilience.

The debentures offer up to 4% annual return over a 5, 10 or 15-year term, making them an attractive option for socially conscious investors. Both individuals and organisations can participate, with minimum investments starting at \$500.

"We believe in the power of community ownership," said Director Jeanette Pope. "This is more than an investment - it's a chance to shape the future of our town while earning a fair return. Together, we can ensure this building remains an asset for generations to come," she said.

The Co-operative currently has 232 members from Castlemaine, surrounding districts, and beyond, and would be delighted to welcome more new members.

Reconnect with MASG

Way back in 2006 a bunch of passionate and purpose-led Mount Alexander Shire residents banded together around their desire for coordinated action on climate change in our community. This convergence led to the creation of the Mount Alexander Sustainability Group, known as MASG, – pronounced 'masG' – as the peak sustainability organisation in our shire working with community for a more sustainable future together.

Our actions are focused across waste reduction, renewable energy, energy efficiency and agriculture, with community at the heart of all we do. Over the past almost 20 years, we (MASG) have experienced booms of enthusiasm, support and program development such as with our popular Repair Café, Wash Against Waste Trailer and Healthy Soils project. Additionally, like most community organisations, we've also experienced challenges and periods of less connectivity with our community, especially during, and since, the recent pandemic years.

This month, June 2025, we're getting out and about in our community, your community, to (re)connect and chat about what's happening locally in sustainability and regenerative practice, what you'd like to see happening, or simply to be there for questions around "what does this even mean?!". It's wonderful to see these practices being revived-reclaimed-repurposed as climate action, sustainability and regenerative action, especially on a local scale with projects such as YIMBY community composting, The Good Op-Shop sewing sessions and the West End Resilience Group Home Energy Efficiency Workshops. Whilst none of these are MASG programs, their development indicates the important work MASG has done over two decades to nurture establishment of purpose-led sustainability projects in our shire. We celebrate this shared action for climate, sustainability and future for community, and look forward to what we can all be doing together going forward.

Please keep an eye out for our MASG representatives (volunteers and staff) across the shire this month, as we get out and about encouraging conversations and connections with

MASG, especially as support by coming a member. What's the benefit of being a MASG member? The usual things - voting rights at the AGM, receive the e-newsletter - but also, to be supporting a community organisation that advocates for your voice in climate action. As a community organisation we are guided by the focus of "Local Voices - Local Action - Global Change", and the community development principles of acting with community, being informed by community and acknowledging community as the experts in their own lives. Welcome to winter! Like us, you've probably finished harvesting from your trees, unless you still have any late apples or pears still to pick. The fruit trees are well on the way to going dormant. It's a beautiful time of year to be in the garden, and there's plenty to do. There's lots going on this month with trees available to order, and a brand new Masterclass called Design Your Home Orchard coming up—you'll find the links at the end of the article.

Tip #1: It's time to order new fruit trees

Our first tip this month is to think about whether you want to plant any new fruit trees this winter. We'll be having four open days this year at our on-farm Carr's Organic Fruit Tree Nursery on the last weekend of June and the first weekend of July, from 10am to 4pm each day. It's the only time of year you can visit the farm to buy a fruit tree, and we love it when locals drop in!

There's usually a good range available, but to be sure of getting what you want we recommend that you preorder your trees through our online shop:<u>openfoodnetwork.org.au/carrsorganic-fruit-tree-nursery/shop</u> and we'll have them ready for you to pick up at one of the open days.

Being Harcourt's only fruit tree nursery, we feel a responsibility to save heritage apple varieties that are going out of fashion. You can help make sure these beautiful and interesting old heirloom varieties don't get completely lost by growing one in your garden! The best way to maintain our apple heritage is by growing, eating, sharing, talking about, and loving as many different varieties as possible. However, it can be nerve-wracking to give valuable garden space to a variety you've never heard of. To solve this problem, we've created a range of multigraft apple trees that combine well known varieties (like Gala, Fuji, and Pink Lady) on the same tree as more exotic varieties like Winter Banana and Worcester Pearmain. It's a low-risk way to try out a new variety in your garden and add to your biodiversity.

Tip #2: Winter is a good time for garden planning

If you are thinking about planting new trees, you need to decide (a) where to put them, and (b) what varieties you

want to plant. To help with this, we're holding an online Masterclass starting on June 12 (see the link at the end of the article).

One of the benefits of living here in Harcourt is that most people have enough space for a decent-sized garden, with lots of room for fruit trees. But, even if you have a large garden, it might make sense to keep your fruit trees together in one area of the garden, rather than spreading them out. Having a designated orchard area in the garden makes it possible to net the trees under a single structure, rather than having to create a separate structure for each tree. It can also be easier to set up a simple but effective irrigation system if all the trees with similar needs are in one place.

If you'd rather have your fruit trees scattered throughout your garden, that can work too! It's quite easy to protect a single fruit tree from fruit fly and birds with a simple hoop structure that is easy to construct from star pickets and polypipe. Similarly, it's not that hard to irrigate individual trees that are scattered around your garden, it just might take multiple pipes and offshoots to reach them all.

Tip #3: It's OK to prune apricots now

One of the questions we often get at this time of year is whether it's too late to prune apricot trees. The short answer is no, it's not. Our philosophy with pruning fruit trees is that there's no "right" or "wrong", there's just "cuts" and "consequences".

So, what are the consequences of pruning apricot trees at the moment? Well, if you have fungal disease in your apricot trees (which is very common in Harcourt) there's a higher chance that you'll spread it around the tree if you prune the tree in cold, wet weather. You can minimise this risk by choosing a fine, sunny day to do your pruning with a few fine days forecast ahead. That will help your pruning cuts to heal quickly.

The other reason we usually recommend pruning apricot trees in late summer is because they tend to be very big, vigorous trees, and pruning them in summer is likely to result in a smaller growth response to your pruning cuts. Pruning your trees in winter is likely to stimulate a bit more growth in the tree, but that's not necessarily a bad thing. It's just important to prune them thoughtfully so you don't encourage your tree to get too bushy. However, one of the big advantages of pruning your apricot tree (or any fruit tree) when it has lost its leaves is that you can clearly see the shape of the tree. This makes deciding how to prune it much easier!

Before we go...

Lastly this month it's a good time to reflect on other ways of generally improving the health of your garden. Try to add more diversity each year different varieties of fruit trees, different understorey plants around and near your fruit trees (e.g. herbs, vegetables or shrubs—or even just weeds!), and even different microbes in your soil.

Believe it or not, biodiversity is one of your best defences against the risks you face from pests and diseases, and even the weather! Wondering how that works? Well, the more varieties of fruit trees you have, the more likely you are to harvest at least something every year. A particularly wet spring, for example, may lead to disease in the stone fruit but the apples and pears will thrive.

Having a diverse collection of plants in your garden (especially flowering plants, and yes-even weeds) provides good habitat to attract lots of beneficial insects that will do at least half your work of cleaning up any pests. There's also a lot of science emerging about the incredible impact that multiple plants growing in the same soil can have on each other. It's kind of an extension of the old idea of companion planting, but we now know that plants communicate with each other underground; they swap nutrients and microbes, and they help to make each other healthier.
